	<b>Front Entryway</b> : Repaint the front door, add a new welcome mat, polish hardware, and clean front-facing windows.
	Exterior Surfaces: Power wash siding, brick, windows, and porches.
	Lighting: Update light fixtures, ideally with matching finishes for a cohesive look.
	<b>House Numbers &amp; Mailbox</b> : Replace with updated, matching fixtures—an inexpensive way to add instant polish.
