	Lighting: Update light fixtures, ideally with matching finishes for a cohesive look.
	House Numbers & Mailbox: Replace with updated, matching fixtures—an inexpensive way to add instant polish.
	Finishing Touches: Add flower boxes or pots with seasonal blooms, and hang a
	tasteful wreath on the front door.
